# Introductions/Announcement/Updates

- Introductions
- SWES open yesterday, tonight, tomorrow and closed Sat based on weather forecast at this time. SWES number: 412-779-1329 message is updated regularly to alert when SWES is open.
- Point-In-Time (P-I-T) surveys to be completed 1/25/07 and due at begin of 2/07 to Terri Laver.
- Mae-Emergency Shelter. Women are being transported to Miryam's after intake at Smithfield Church. Miryam's has bins for belongings for the women and then they can typically remain in the building until the day program opens if they should choose. Overflow of men go to Shephard's Heart Church when Smithfield Church reaches 75 individuals (men), veteran status preferred.
- Further general discussion related to P-I-T surveys: pros/cons.

**<u>Amy Kroll</u>**-General overview of new Allegheny County Forensic Initiative for CIT with the City Police, Pre Booking Diversion Issues and other combined initiatives.

- Allegheny County Forensic Initiative.
- Sequential Intercept Model-Intercept individuals before entering the criminal justice system.
- Forensic support
- Cro-MISA
- MH Court
- Max-out Program (Re-Integration)
- Grant-Dept of Justice for CIT Program for 30months. Nationally known in 35 other states. PA never had a CIT (Community Treatment Team-Crises Intervention). Steering committee has been formed. In conjunction with the City Police. 2 committees: protocol & curriculum. 40hr training for volunteer police officers, Mon-Fri and will have modules that include psychiatric disorders, education on thought disorders, mood disorders, etc. They will actually have assignments to do such as mock auditory hallucinations while doing certain tasks in the community and to undergo a mock psychiatric evaluation.

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- Also training/education to include issues such as: Developmental disorders, risk factors with PTSD, co-occurring illness such as D&A, aged issues such as dementia, visits places such as inpatient units. Consumer prospective will also be involved.
- De-escalation techniques more focused on mental illness.
- Need: 50 dispatchers/50 officers/20 MH Professionals.
- Mobile Crises will be another portion of the curriculum.
- Plan includes Central Receiving Centers-RN staffing/D&A specialists/On-Call psychiatrists/etc.
- Persons who commit non-violent crimes will be given education regarding being sent to a center or directly to jail. The centers are of voluntary nature ONLY. They will not be locked facilities.
- Holistic Triage will be provided at the center.
- By May 2007-protocol that the police have to follow based on the person's need:
   MH, D&A, medical, etc.
- If crime committed: police are pre-booking diversion system. There will be two persons in the jail, one already is an established FT employee currently in the jail~another staff member to be hired for Tue-Sat or Wed-Sun 10p-6a or 7a and assess/monitor/establish identification-holistic assessment will be completed and appropriate diversion for NON-VIOLENT crimes. Will access attached services as indicated, such as: if the individual is involved in CTT/ICM/etc. Concept Divert the jail sentence and intervene immediately. Service plan will be quickly formulated and will need to be followed with idea of outcome: person more stabilized by time of preliminary hearing.
- Initially there will be some County respite beds until further collaborative/services in place.
- Individuals will be followed closely in the community.
- Two centers are to be established. These centers will be for a set number of individuals (example, #14 each center). Average stay of few days, then on to alternate disposition (such as home or alternate living arrangement). Example: Pitt student, first psychotic break, for public safety-this person may be placed temporary for several days to stabilize to a degree before return to dorm at Pitt or apartment in Oakland).
- Officer responsibility with CIT: Officers will need to make judgment call on what service is most needed at that time: Mobile Crises? 302? Triage Center? Medical ER?
- These are voluntary, non-locked centers. Again, the offense must be non-violent in nature.
- Dept of Justice grant-to view other sites to settle curriculum and to get the classes running.
- Other grant for 3years- staff salary, respite beds (central receiving center), steering committee to get program up and running.
- No monies identified specifically for the Triage Centers at this time.
- 1st year 30 individuals served-GOAL under the terms of the grant.
- 2<sup>nd</sup> & 3<sup>rd</sup> year 100+ individuals served-GOAL under the terms of the grant.
- Diane Johnson-Similar to the drop-off center in the Engagement Center proposal. ??May this be incorporated with this forensic program/model as well? Amy would like to coordinate/collaborate to see if this could be incorporated. There is already some funding and more funding being explored for the forensic individuals. There is a huge overlap with homeless and forensic. Possibly, the other center could be geared more towards the ones who do not fit engagement center for homeless.
- Many of these forensic center models have been visited, such as in Florida. Very blended centers that incorporate forensic/mh/d&a/homelessness/etc.
- There is a primary goal to keep those with mental illness out of the criminal justice system.

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- Police Officers often struggle with the issue of not wanting to arrest an individual, but had no other option/solution.
- Huge recognition dinner annually will ensue for the officers who participate.
- Ft. Lauderdale: took 10yrs to come to fruition for their model, similar to the one being established in Allegheny County.
- In 2005 Innovations in American Government award won by Allegheny Co Forensics.
- Funding is already being searched for with regard to when the grant terms expire: one is a 30 month term; the other is a 3yr term.
- A portion of the CIT monies gained are to help pay the cost of monies to train and deploy City Police Officers. This is often OT monies. Often, City of Pgh Police Dept is understaffed on all shifts with current budget. Budget will not cover officers who are "pulled" to do CIT.
- Goal for 33%-50% of City Officers planned to be trained in CIT.
- National Conference being planned-using the Sequential Intercept Model. Workshops may include EBP-Evidence Based Practice (Models), prison re-entry, etc. NOVEMBER 14-16, 2007 @ Sheraton Station Square. 11/14/07-pm only; 11/15/07 all day; 11/16/07 am only. Sue Martello @ 350-7399 is contact for further information. Name of the conference is not set yet. Cost \$175/individual at this time.
- How can EC help the forensic initiate and vice versa??? There needs to be dialogue between the two groups. Office of Community Services and Office of Behavioral Health need to meet first and foremost to structure how these two initiatives can coordinate/collaborate. EC RFI due 2/15/07.
- 2/22/07 next CIT meeting-Amy will need to check with Assistant Chief MacDonald and with Office of Behavioral Health and will get back to HOCC.
- 3/21/07-Forensic Behavioral Task Force meeting. Human Services Bldg @ 1p-3p in the basement.
- Amy will try to get a rep from forensic services to the HOCC meeting on regular basis.

### **Engagement Center (EC)**

- December meeting that incorporated funders, academia, stakeholders, etc. To gain buy-in. Homeless Executive Committee has further discussed, Marc Cherna made a commitment that the County is fully behind the EC. Needs to be lead agency identified and RFI put out this week that is due
- Three things being worked on at present: RFI-Request for Information due by 2/15/07.
  - Lead Agency
  - Agency interested in the housing portion: both the on-site units and the scattered site units.
  - Who is interested in bringing services on-site.
- When all RFI's received, the County will review via internal process and they will identify the lead agency.
- Upcoming HUD application-County wants to include the 25 off-site, scattered, housing units be applied for.

#### <u>SWES</u>

- **80/night** on average, thus far.
- Wed 1/24, Thu 1/25, Fri 1/26 OPEN. Closed Sat 1/27 as per current weather forecast.
- Has been open 7-8 days this year.

# City Sweeps/Street Rounds/Panhandling/Other

This past year (since 1994) has been highest number of deaths. Three deaths in November-December 2006. Mac would like to establish relationship with County Coroner to find out this info. One death was result of being struck by vehicle on Rt 28. One individual deceased in North Side Park. One individual deceased due to

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heroin overdose shortly after being housed. Would like to know the causes of death of others.

- SWEEPS-Mac was out last night: 3 individuals lost their sleeping bags kept under the bridge, as Public Works removed the articles. Need increased communication/coordination with Public Works. Now the metallic yellow signs are posted and any given Tuesday items/belongings may be swept. Mac reviews frequently with folks on the street the issue of Tuesday sweeps. If public works will not work with street outreach, Mac would like to approach Mayor Ravenstal.
- Outreach schedule: Safe A Life (OSAL) reviews case management issues with Safety Net frequently. **OSAL needs more volunteers!!**
- OSAL- Rounds on
  - Tue 6:30p Northside
  - Wed 6:30p Downtown
- Safety Net-Mac is not sure if these days are correct and is not sure of the times.
  - o Tue/Thu- Downtown
  - o Wed- Northside
  - o Tue- Oakland
  - o ?? Southside
  - ?? McKees Rocks
- Safety Zones around schools-Rich Venzia at meeting last Friday. Issue raised re: accusations of homeless individuals camping out on school property (such as Martin Luther King Elem on North Side). Use of Pgh Police/School Police to move the individuals away/out of that area. Signs to be posted and are to be enforced. 3/13/07-Date of announcement of the school safety zone description, what schools are targeted, etc. This will be a comprehensive description of this safety initiative. This also includes what houses need to be boarded up. Safety zone around school is 1000 ft, to our knowledge.
- There have been issues on the North Side (along with the School Safety Zone issue) about the congregation of homeless, specifically the men waiting to enter Light of Life for the evening meal. Light of Life is very close to Martin Luther King Elem. There is not pressure to stop feeding the evening meal, but generally there is not a want to have sight of these persons waiting. (Out of sight, Out of mind??)
- Mac updates: KDKA-Market Square issue aired. Mike Edwards was on the air regarding complaints of persons "hanging" in market square. It was made clear that this is not necessarily an issue of the homeless, but another group of persons using this area inappropriately. It was made clear that the homeless were not targeted as the "problem" persons.
- LET'S BRAINSTORM~How can we do a better job at counting the actual homeless, on the streets? Need assist from other entities such as Pgh Police, City Public Works, etc. Need to expand beyond the city. Let's brainstorm how we can expand this to other agencies that also come in regular contact with the homeless persons in our County. Jail needs included. Hospitals are being included already, but compliance still has room for improvement.
